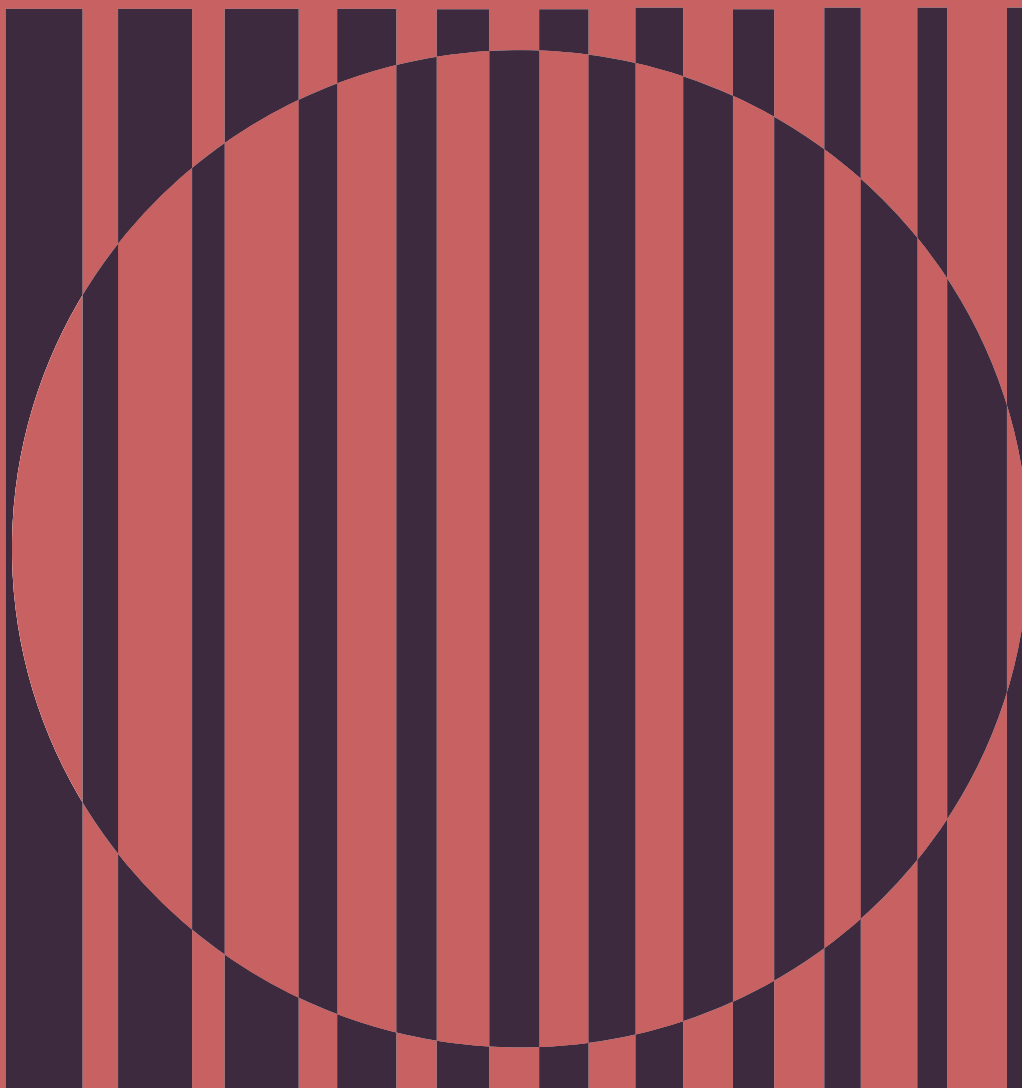

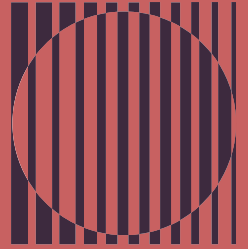

CHAIR

Laure Heidmann | Institut Polytechnique de Paris

Laure is a second-year PhD student in Economics at CREST, working on tax avoidance to assess the extent of these practices and their impact on tax revenues and economic activity. She works on profit shifting by large multinational firms, and examines tax revenue implications and distributional effects on workers. She also investigates the interaction between personal and corporate income tax through the tax arbitrage strategies of high-income individuals in France.

Institut des Politiques Publiques**

Laurent Bach is an Associate Professor of Finance at ESSEC Business School and a research affiliate at the Swedish House of Finance. His work focuses on Entrepreneurial Finance, Corporate Governance, Household Finance, Public Economics, and Political Economy. He studies the impact of financial aid on small businesses, corporate governance changes on firm performance, household investment skills, tax policies on financial behavior, and political mandates on legislative productivity. His research provides empirical insights into how finance and policy shape economic outcomes.

Arun Advani is Associate Professor of Economics at the University of Warwick. He is also a Visiting Senior Fellow at the LSE International Inequalities Institute, as well as being affiliated with the Institute for Fiscal Studies, CAGE Research Centre, CESifo, IZA, and the World Inequality Lab. He studies issues of tax compliance and tax design, with a particular focus on those with high incomes or wealth. He was a Commissioner at the Wealth Tax Commission, and his recent work on capital gains tax and on non-doms has had substantial media and policy impact, including reforms in the UK implemented by recent Conservative governments, and proposed reforms by the Labour Party should they form the next UK government.

In 2023, Professor Zucman received the John Bates Clark Medal of the American Economic Association, awarded to an economist under forty who is judged to have made the most significant contribution to economic thought and knowledge.

He is interested in models which capture firm dynamics through the business cycle, the long-run effects of cycles, and interactions of business cycles with fiscal and monetary policy. In public finance, he is working on capital gains and inter-generational taxation. Specifically, he is working to disentangle the effects of end-of-life provisions on portfolio choice and size of inheritances.

In addition to his academic position, he maintains affiliations with the Institut des politiques publiques, Institute for Fiscal Studies, IZA Institute of Labor Economics, and the European Economic Association, on whose council he sits. Camille Landais holds a PhD from the Paris School of Economics. His research focuses on public finance and labour economics and his articles have appeared in various leading journals such as the American Economic Review, or the Quarterly Journal of Economics. He was awarded the 2016 Prize for French Best Young Economist, and received the Philip Leverhulme Prize in Economics.

Anne-Sophie Lechevallier is a French journalist who has worked for several media outlets. She graduated from the Institut d'Études Politiques de Paris and Columbia University in journalism and also obtained a DEA in American history from the École des Hautes Études en Sciences Sociales.

Her career began in July 2001 at «Paris Match» where she worked as a journalist until December 2020. She then became head of the economics department until November 2021.

Afterward, she joined the newspaper «Libération» as a journalist. She is also the co-author of the book «Le poids des mots du Président; ce que la parole de Macron dit de lui» (The Weight of the President's Words: What Macron's Speech Says About Him), published in May 2018, which analyzes Emmanuel Macron's rhetoric through his speeches and interviews.

Antoine Bozio | Institut des politiques publiques, Ecole des hautes études en sciences sociales and Paris School of Economics

Antoine Bozio is a Professor at the Paris School of Economics and the Director of the Institut des Politiques Publiques (IPP). His research focuses on Public Economics, Social Security, and Labor Economics, with a particular emphasis on taxation, pension systems, and social policies.

He has extensively studied the design and effects of retirement systems, contributing to debates on pension reform and intergenerational equity. His work also explores how taxation influences labor supply and income distribution, providing empirical insights into the impact of fiscal policies on economic inequality and workforce participation. Through his research and policy engagement, he plays a key role in shaping discussions on social protection and economic policy in France and beyond.

Bastien Lignereux | Université Paris Cité

Bastien Lignereux teaches tax law at Université Paris Cité. He was formerly head of the wealth tax unit at the French Ministry of Finance.

Eric Coquerel | LFI-NFP Member of Parliament for Seine-Saint-Denis and Head of the Committee on Finance



Former company director and coordinator of the “Parti de Gauche” (radical left, 2014-2021), regional councillor for Ile de France (2010-2017), Eric Coquerel was first elected LFI-NFP MP for the 1st district of Seine-Saint-Denis in 2017. He was re-elected in 2022 and again in 2024 and became President of the Finance Committee of the French national Assembly.

During the five years of his first mandate, he led an annual report by the Finance Committee calling for a larger share of the French budget to be devoted to the need to protect the environment. He was co-rapporteur for a special mission on universal taxation, which has resulted in amendments from opposition MPs over the past two years to improve tax fairness. In 2021 he published his book on public debt “Lâchez-nous la dette”.

The aim of his presidency is to combat income evasion and speculation, to achieve a better distribution of wealth between capital and labour, and to combat social, ecological and fiscal inequalities. An annual report on tax avoidance has been created under his presidency, and another mission on the taxation of profits has already taken place. In 2023, he also has launched a mission on the corporate tax differential. He is currently chairing a parliamentary committee of inquiry into budget projections and deficits for 2023-2024, which he considers to be mistaken.

David Amiel | Ensemble Member of Parliament for Paris 13th Constituency

David Amiel is a French politician and deputy for Paris’s 13th constituency since 2022. A graduate of the École normale supérieure and Princeton University, he was a close advisor to President Emmanuel Macron from 2017 to 2019. He later co-authored *Le progrès ne tombe pas du ciel*, advocating progressive policies against populism.



After working on Benjamin Griveaux’s 2020 mayoral campaign in Paris, he was elected to the National Assembly under the Ensemble coalition. His political career has been marked by his commitment to economic reforms and social justice within the presidential majority. Since his election, he has been actively involved in the finance committee, working on budgetary policies, ecological transition, and reducing inequalities.

THE ISSUE OF BILLIONAIRE TAXATION INTO THE CONTEXT OF THE BROADER QUESTION OF REDISTRIBUTION

Thomas Piketty | EHESS, WIL and WID

Thomas Piketty is Director of Studies at the Ecole des Hautes Etudes en Sciences Sociales (EHESS) and Professor at the Paris School of Economics. His research lies at the intersection of political and historical economics and economic and social history. He has published numerous research articles in international journals such as the Quarterly Journal of Economics, Journal of Political Economy, American Economic Review, Review of Economic Studies, Explorations in Economic History, Annales: Histoire, Sciences Sociales. In particular, he is the author of historical and theoretical works on the relationship between economic development, the distribution of wealth and political conflict. This work has highlighted the importance of political, social and fiscal institutions in the historical dynamics of wealth distribution. Thomas Piketty is also co-director of the World Inequality Lab and the World Inequality Database, and one of the initiators of the Manifesto for the Democratization of Europe. He is the author of several books, including *Les Hauts revenus en France au 20e siècle* (2001), *Le Capital au 21e siècle* (2013), *Capital et idéologie* (2019), *Une Brève histoire de l'égalité* (2021) and *Une Histoire du conflit politique* (2023).



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
